**Horse & Pony Jumping Conditions** 

Late Entries will be accepted until 12 noon on Tuesday 22 October 2013. This will incur a 50 □ additional charge. Stabling will NOT be guaranteed. Entries will NOT be catalogued.

Please read the General Conditions. These apply to jumping events where applicable, including regulations governing Certificates of Height.

Time of Events - Times stated in the Schedule for Jumping Competitions are approximate only, and will be adjusted after entries close according to entries received. The right is reserved to start an event before the catalogued time.

Overlap - Consideration shall be shown to competitors who are entered in competition that may overlap. Please see the Senior Steward concerned but classes will not be delayed.

In Arena 1, Competitors must jump in the order as drawn and printed in the Catalogue. All riders must be suitably attired when entering the ring, and competitors will not be allowed in the ring without jackets.

Classes run under ESNZ. Rules and Regulations

A Horse can only have 2 starts per day except for the accumulator classes. If classes have an excessive number of entries they will be divided & prizes adjusted.

Logos on Saddle Blankets will only be permitted if they have been registered with Equestrian Sports New Zealand.

Rules for World Cup Class - Art: 273.3, 273.4.3, 273.2.2 Table A two round competition not against the clock in the first round and against the clock in the second round. Athletes return for the second round in accordance with art: 273.2.2 Athletes are classified according to their aggregate penalties over both rounds and time incurred in the second round.

The FEI Code of Conduct - For the Welfare of the Horse

The Federation Equestre Internationale IFEI expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to

acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences

- At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- Horses and Athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten the welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful
  attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions,
  stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the
  event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
